A MESSAGE FROM THE PASTOR

We are Blessed to Be a Blessing



In my first church as a new pastor I was Associate on staff with a well-seasoned senior pastor. The motto of Our Savior's was: "Blessed to Be a Blessing." It's short and easy to remember, but

also very true and universally applicable. The phrase was based on discussion and prayer in a Bible Study group and adapted from Genesis 12:2 where God blesses Abraham and gives him and his family a purpose.

Do you realize how blessed you are? We all are very blessed, despite what it may feel like sometimes. God is a generous and faithful giver.

And beyond the spiritual blessing of God's saving love, we receive God's material blessings daily, and not only for ourselves, but the whole world to share God's blessings with everyone. In that simple but powerful way, God is giving us out of God's endless abundance. All would have enough, if we trusted God enough to share all those blessings gratefully with those who don't have enough. God even promises that when we share blessings they are multiplied.

The apostle Paul wrote: "He who supplies seed to the sower and bread for food will supply and multiply your seed for sowing and increase the harvest of your righteousness." (2 Corinthians 9:10, NRSV, read vv.11-12 for more)

In many ways that is what stewardship means, why we give offerings, and how the church is caring for any in need. God is the source of everything as we remember in our offering prayer this month, and we in turn ask God to make us generous givers who joyfully witness to the love of Jesus.

In November, the church not only joins in the thanksgiving for harvest blessings and service of veterans, but remembers all the saints and Christ's eternal kingship. WATCH WORSHIP on You Tube Live

Here's how you can join either live or watch a recording:

Each week, we <u>email a link</u> to the livestream service, together with the worship bulletin that includes the words of the service and ministry announcements.


Worship on YouTube

• Click the "<u>Subscribe</u>" button on St. Paul's YouTube channel page, in order to receive automatic notifications of new videos or when we go live. It's like church bells on your device!



• You can browse all <u>past video recordings</u> (since spring 2020), and you can find <u>scheduled live streams</u> in the "Videos" menu by selecting "Upcoming live streams" from the "Uploads ▼" drop down (where you are able to set a reminder and more).

Why NO ONLINE COMMUNION?

With the closing of churches during the Covid-19 Coronavirus pandemic that affected the US in early 2020, many congregations moved worship online in a few different forms. Over the summer months, St. Paul's drive-in services were well attended and

included Communion but will now cease as of the end of October.

It may seem that sharing worship online could include the celebration and reception of Communion despite physical separation. After careful reconsideration of both theological and practical issues involved in the question about virtual Communion, Pastor Stefan Munker has concluded that the sacrament is better reserved for a physically gathered worship community.

This is not an easy decision but is shared with ELCA Presiding Bishop and supported by our synod bishop. Our congregation definitely wants to protect the health of our members and community during the Covid-19 pandemic. If we decided to allow limited numbers of worshipers in our sanctuary during the winter months, precautions would limit attendance to passive watching and services would not include Communion.

The Word of God is the all-sufficient means of giving us forgiveness, life, and salvation. Pastor Stefan Munker longs for the time when we can safely resume the meal celebration of our life in Christ together. He provided a more detailed explanation to our church council including that Lutherans do not condone private Communion without an ordained presider, and the difference between watching live or a recording later.

While we worship, learn and serve apart, may Christ who is always present among us through the gift of the Holy Spirit continue to give us peace, preserve our health and keep us united, as we abide in faith, hope and love thanks to the grace and mercy of God who is the source of our life and salvation.

Join Pastor Stefan Munker for six weekly sessions about writings by one of 21st century's most noted theologians, activists, and martyrs. The study sessions began October 26 and examine various aspects of faith and look at Bible passages during our discussion. *Discover more meaning and reclaim hope in the face of adversity*.
